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Our 2008 Vice Captain: Barry Ingham

(An abbreviation of his life story – so far)

I don't know when I first joined the Left Handers but I do know it was prior to 1973. In that year I played my first events with the Association. I came to golf after twelve years of cycle racing, football, cricket, (sex and rock 'n roll). As a left handed cricketer when I turned to golf I was unable to get hold of second hand clubs and played right handed for about 12 months. I then got hold of a set of Bob Charles clubs, reverted to left-handed, and saw my handicap rapidly come down. Prior to 1973 I was unable to get away from the bank where I held a junior position. Using my holidays (!) in 1973 I played in the 36 hole Championships at Hawkestone Park where I seem to remember there were over 100 competitors with both the first and tenth tees being used. Playing of a **handicap of 11**, I won at Hillside with a gross 81 and at Portpatrick with a gross 77. (I'm enjoying this – no sign of memory loss now!) At the time I was only interested in playing well – how the events were organised and who the Captain was interested me not at all. Clearly a lot of members were wealthy businessmen. I remember sitting at a table with 2 such individuals who were discussing the difficulty of landing a plane in a cross wind. I was having similar difficulties with the wind as I travelled to the events on my Honda 90 with my clubs on my back. Eventually I got down to single figures. The second stage of my membership saw my handicap go up again to the somewhat sad position I find myself today, only to match Gerald Frost on one of my rare good days. I have been fortunate to play over 1000 different courses in my golfing career and it was appropriate that I should enjoy my 1000th course at Alwoodley with the 4 ball being all left handed and winning 6+5 of course!

Golf is a game that lasts for life providing one is fortunate enough to remain in reasonable health. Our Association can be enjoyed by those who turn up expecting to play well and those of us who just turn up. It was satisfying to set off for home after a day's golf having won a prize. Now I would need sat-nav to find the prize table. Do I enjoy my golf with the left-handers any less? – Of course not, although it requires a thick skin to suffer the banter from those who wonder what people like me think we are doing.

Last year I was elected Vice Captain, with a view, subject to good behaviour, of following John Carter as Captain in 2009. The year is a significant one in that we celebrate our 50th Anniversary. It is also significant in that I hope to reach the age of 75. What more could anyone want than to be Captain of a wonderful association and no longer have to pay for a TV licence? All this under a benevolent Labour Government providing they still are the Government by then. Best of all, the prospect of telling Alan Haines what to do is enticing. "Captain to you Mr Secretary" and "Sir" to the others instead of "Scouse git". Most golf clubs seem to elect a Captain who, following his year of office, becomes Immediate Past Captain. The rationale being that the outgoing Captain lends his experience to the new Captain. I prefer our system and think it must be difficult to retain enthusiasm once a term in the top position is over.

I hope to assist John to have a successful and enjoyable year in office in any way that I can. The future at this stage can take care of itself.

### *Wilson Henry*



Wilson died in October last year aged 81 after a long illness. He was our Captain in 1974 and was an Honorary Life Member of our Association. At a very well attended funeral service his remarkable record of voluntary service was praised. We can only feel grateful that in his busy life he somehow found time to lend his many talents to our Association. An accountant, he founded Wilson Henry & Co in Liverpool in 1958. This is a very well respected firm and the integrity of Wilson was a major factor. The British Left Handed Golfers Association were represented by Roger Wood (Captain in 1985 & 1989) and Barry Ingham (Treasurer). Wilson was a member of West Lancs Golf Club with a low handicap and he was always a joy to play with. In accordance with the family request we have made a donation to Great Ormond Street Children's Charity.

Although Wilson did not play golf in his latter years he always enjoyed reading about the Association in the various Newsletters and does feature in many aspects of our history, which Barry Ingham has almost concluded. His widow, Phyl, wrote to us following the funeral:

"May I say a big thank you to the members of the British Left Handed Golfers Association who came to Wilson's funeral. As you know Wilson loved the Association. Wilson and I enjoyed so many of the competitions and the social side, especially Portpatrick.

Wilson was a very big part of our lives and we are grateful for the wonderful years we had with him. Thank you for your generous donation in memory of Wilson. Your support and generosity is very much appreciated by the whole family.”



## *Finance*

Our accounts are finalised at the end of July and presented to the AGM not long afterwards. A written financial statement is given to members prior to the AGM together with accounts and I answer any resulting questions. The full minutes of the AGM appear later in this newsletter. Geography does result in members being unable to attend the AGM and I am always happy to answer any questions in respect of the accounts from those members unable to attend the AGM. A year-end of July has advantages and disadvantages. Disadvantages in that we still have events to come for which deposits have been paid and prizes purchased.

Twice a year Alan (Secretary) and I get together, firstly to reconcile the alleged membership with paying members and secondly to prepare the year-end accounts. The latter is necessary because Alan runs a float as in the main most of our money spent in advance, is on golf club deposits and prizes. We meet up between Wetherby and Liverpool, play a round of golf and complete our work. He wins 6 & 5 and this keeps him affable!

Long serving members will remember that when I took over we had no money. Indeed we owed money for items of clothing, paid for by members but not delivered and to a golf club. Our right-handed friends from Ashbourne were generous in providing financial support, as was our Life Member Tom Hayes. We now have £8000.00 in liquid funds. This is not my success. Rather it is down to the way in which the Association is run, the Committee and members. I just write the figures in the books.

We are not a profit-seeking organisation. So why do we need £8000.00? Golf is obviously getting more expensive and golf clubs more businesslike. To set up a year long fixture list Alan needs £2500.00 by way of deposits and he buys all prizes for each fixture. On January 26<sup>th</sup> each year around £1500.00 subscription income comes into our account by way of standing order payments. It is not always clear to which member this money applies. Joint and company accounts can confuse but over the years Alan and I have solved most of these problems.

The Committee have supported a decision to negate membership to any member who has not paid a subscription for at least 2 years. This has been handled with sensitivity. Sending newsletters to anyone who is no longer supportive is expensive. Postage costs alone are rising. Against rising costs we have kept a day's golf to £50 - £55 together with unaltered subscription. Some days we make a small profit others a loss. In rough terms subscription income covers the running of the Association. The increase in reserves is because of the substantial donations from Alan's Portpatrick venture and the very profitable visits to Ashbourne Golf Club. Such income streams are not guaranteed.

An average days lefties golf provides a possible 27 holes, lunch, dinner and prizes on good quality courses. Very few clubs will reduce the package price for those only playing 18 holes. Some years ago at the AGM I raised the possibility of just 18 holes of golf and dispensing with a formal evening dinner and prize presentation. This was firmly rejected. It's clear that members prefer the existing format. All golf societies are suffering from low turnouts. Senior Opens, Pay and Play, Two for One and petrol costs are all factors. The Committee is well aware of all the above but also what our members want and our turn out has not declined. At the top of our list are visits to courses of quality without ridiculous costs of the Wentworths, Birkdales etc.

At our AGM's, held after golf and before dinner and with distances to travel there is little time available. Members may be reluctant to ask questions for these reasons or be unable to attend that particular event. For this reason I felt it prudent to go into more detail. As I have said earlier I welcome any questions from members.

One final bit of special pleading – comparatively few members pay by individual cheques and not standing orders. When a cheque for £12.50 arrives in the post I have to drive to the bank and struggle for a parking space, as I'm no longer allowed in the staff car park. Cheques received at meetings are no problem at all as I have to go to the bank in any event. Standing orders are available from either Alan or myself for anyone who has seen the light. My involvement in the BLHGA and other organisations prompted comment from a member of bank staff that they see more of me now than when I was their manager. I think it's called scouse wit.

Matters Arising:

Members were reminded that with the ever increasing postal and stationery costs we should use emails wherever possible. Members should advise the Secretary of the email addresses where appropriate.

2006 – 7 Secretary's Report

Membership: *A good year with 11 new members. 20 enquiries for membership were received throughout the year. 6 of these were in respect of people hearing about us via the Championships but sadly no new members emerged. As our Treasurer has mentioned in his financial report I have written to all non-payers and those who have not responded will be deleted from our list of members once Barry has received the annual subscriptions in January 2008. 72 members have played at least one fixture with 25 playing 4 fixtures or more.*

Website: *My sincere thanks go to Chris Birch who has done a great job with our website. It's virtually complete and will carry all our current fixtures, prizewinners and other BLHGA information. It will be fully interactive for all members. You will for example be able to put clubs for sale etc. We may have to limit certain members to 10 items at a time. (The Captain has asked me to mention that anyone wishing to buy a new driver should contact him first. He has many for sale-all have only been used once!) Barry Ingham has now finalised the history of the Association – a very difficult task separating facts from fiction/gossip and this will also feature on the website. Chris has attempted to ensure that whenever a search is made we will be on the first page. I am certain it will improve our membership and I will also ensure its one of the links on the World site www.walg.org*

Meetings:

The upward trend of attendances last year has continued in 2007 with the average now towards the 37 mark. In fact Ingestre will be the meeting with our lowest attendance of 34. This is in stark contrast to several years ago when I have had to cancel meetings due to poor attendance. The current number of fixtures appears about right and the numbers attending the majority of events is over the 35 mark. It is important to have a good geographical spread of fixtures and this year we will have visited both Buckingham and Cleckheaton. We have for example visited Ross on Wye and other venues towards the South West but numbers for such events have been disappointing. Next year Portpatrick and Rotherham have already been provisionally booked, as has the Championships and we will be visiting Buckingham to celebrate our 2008 Captain's Day with John Carter. We will also have our President's Day venue. This will leave us with about 6 fixtures to select. As I mentioned last year ease of travel has been an important ingredient with the golf clubs being very close to the motorways. Both our Captain's Day and President's Day were highly successful occasions as was our annual visit to Portpatrick. Buckingham is also popular as we have many members with a MK postcode. When you look at the accounts you will see that the "profit" made on some events minus the "loss" made on others roughly equates to the increase in our bank balances. Whilst we do have competition from "Open events" £50.00 per fixture still represents excellent value. We must ensure we play on quality courses and our number one intention is to have an excellent days golf with the unique leftie fellowship. We have not and will not go to a course just to make a profit. We are in a strong financial position and we should use this to improve our fixture list.

Championships:

The Championship at the St Pierre was again held over 2 days and was very successful both in terms of the quality of golf and numbers attending. My special thanks go to Tony Broadhurst for all his hard work with the Championship. These things are not easy to organise but as usual he did a splendid job. His efforts continued over the weekend and with the help of Frank McCabe assisting with the cards the whole event went very smoothly. Next year is already booked for Carden Park.

Our congratulations go to Matthew Parnham (National Champion and winner of the Bob Charles) and David Lenihan for winning the Malcolmson.

World Championships – New Zealand

2008 sees the Championship going to New Zealand in March. We have about a dozen members going and wish them every success

World Championship Bid

The committee are considering bidding to hold the World Championships in Scotland in either 2010 or 2011. Clearly work is still progressing and we had hoped to secure the Old Course and a further course run by the St Andrew's Trust. Sadly we have just learned that this request has been turned down by the Trust and alternatives are now under review.

2006 – 7 Treasurer's Report

I would like to write something original but we appear to have got into a very comfortable financial rut. It's a bit like Ground Hog day or more accurately Ground Hog year. To start at the beginning, subscriptions for 2007 slightly exceed that for 2006. This is very gratifying when most societies report falling numbers for a variety of reasons. Pay and play, two for one and seniors golf have impacted, not only on societies but also on golf clubs. This steady income means that we do not have to avoid venues where we can anticipate a net loss. Even without this factor we have had some major earners.

Alan Haines made his usual donation of £500 from Portpatrick. Given the value of this most enjoyable event to the participants this is quite remarkable and is in stark contrast to when the previous gentleman ran the trip.

Like last year our visit to Ashbourne for the President's Day was both very enjoyable and profitable thanks to Frank's stewardship.

A newcomer this year was our first visit to Bromsgrove, which produced a healthy profit. I gather not everyone liked the course. I did, probably because unusually for me I got a couple of pars.

A few events produced small losses, which does not matter as long as members had a good day. Tony Broadhurst did his usual excellent job of organising our Championship at St Pierre. Whilst the committee would be happy if this showcase event produced a loss, it did not. The admin costs of running the year are minimal. Inevitably the Secretary incurs the major costs. Thanks are due to Ron and Karen Walker who make their home available for committee meetings. We even get bacon butties and coffee to add to the comfort. I hold a stock of bag tags and during the year we have bought more sweaters and shirts, which are held by Frank McCabe. Overall, in the balances held between the bank, secretary and stock we have seen an increase of around £750.00 from this time last year. You will note from the accounts that this equates to the difference in the events making a profit and those making a loss. This would endorse we've got things about right. Therefore I see no reason, despite rising costs to increase subscription levels. The raffles continue to be productive and out of proceeds we pay gratuities. These, plus the numbers attending and making prompt payment, make us welcome visitors. I thank those who run the events, often sacrificing some of their own golf, as they collect money and organise pairings. In particular I thank those who handle our finances on the few occasions I am unable to attend.

Finally Alan and I have embarked on pruning the list of members on our books who have not paid a subscription for 2 years or more. This has been done with sensitivity a word not normally associated with our Secretary.(and I am typing it!). As a result we have received some payments, which will show in next years accounts. It will also reduce costs in respect of printing, telephone and postage.

I will of course answer any questions from the floor at the AGM.
